A combination of the barriers to entry that create monopolies and the product differentiation that characterizes monopolistic competition can create the setting for an oligopoly. For example, when a government grants a patent for an invention to one firm, it may create a monopoly.

### Why It Matters: Monopolistic Competition and Oligopoly ...

In oligopoly there are fewer firms than in perfect competition or monopolistic competition, but more than in monopoly. Unlike perfectly or monopolistically competitive markets, there are barriers to entry and exit. 6.

### Monopolistic Competition and Oligopoly | Principles of ...

There are four types of competition in a free market system: perfect competition, monopolistic competition, oligopoly, and monopoly. Under monopolistic

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competition, many sellers offer differentiated products—products that differ slightly but serve similar purposes. By making consumers aware of product differences, sellers exert some control ...

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In a real sense, the models of monopolistic competition and oligopoly are combinations of the models of perfect competition and monopoly. As you progress through this module, think about the similarities and the differences between each of these models of market structure.

Perfect competition and monopoly are at opposite ends of the competition spectrum. A perfectly competitive market has many firms selling identical products, who all act as price takers in the face of the competition. If you recall, price takers are firms that have no market power. They simply have to take the market price as given.
